News of Note

- This Friday, TUC will be introducing an online bookstore operated by the company Akademos, Inc. Links to the online bookstore will be available from the TUC website under Quick Links and under Current Students. The online bookstore will function much like other online bookstores, in that you will be able to buy new and used books, buy eBooks, rent books and resell your books when done using them. The advantage of TUC having its own online bookstore is the convenience of being able to look up titles from your current booklist by course or professor, or browse by academic program, and see and purchase (or rent) all your required and recommended texts in one place. - As a reminder, the Library will continue to acquire at least one copy of all required and recommended textbooks, either in eBook format when available or in print. Any print texts are located in the Reserve Collection and are for in-Library use only.
- Over Winter Break shelving was installed on the Library south side to allow for easier access to the Library's remaining current issues of print journals and magazines. The most recent issues are displayed with their covers showing; the previous issues can be found on the shelf underneath. Older print journals are still located in the stacks on the north (quiet) side of the Library, and you can still find current newspapers on the coffee table by the Computer Lab. Please feel free to ask a librarian for help if you're not sure where to find a print journal!
- As a reminder, the current print journal issues represent a very small portion of the Library's journal subscriptions. The vast majority of the Library's journal subscriptions are online. The best place to check to see if the Library has a particular journal, magazine, or newspaper – in print format or online format - is to use our [A-Z Journals](#) list. There is a link to A-Z Journals under 'Selected Tools' in the upper left of all our web pages.
- Product update: [AccessMedicine](#) and [AccessPharmacy](#) have a new interface! The new interface is more streamlined, displays better on mobile devices, and has improved search functionality. Resource Spotlight: Bates' Visual Guide to Physical Examination with OSCE Clinical Skills Videos

After receiving positive feedback from our campus trial in November, the Library initiated a subscription to [Bates' Visual Guide to Physical Examination with OSCE \(Objective Structured Clinical Examination\) Clinical Skills Videos](#). Bates' Visual Guide is a teaching and learning tool that we previously had available in DVD format and streaming. The web-based Bates' that we now have is brand-new - the original Bates' Physical Examination videos have been updated, and new OSCE Clinical Skills videos were added. There are currently 5 OSCE videos available, with an additional 5 videos expected to be added soon. Additionally, since the new version of Bates' is web-based, the Mac incompatibility issues that you may

remember from the streaming version are no longer an issue (though the resource may not be accessible on all mobile devices).

The Bates' videos demonstrate head-to-toe and systems-based physical examination techniques on different patients. The OSCE videos are designed to help with preparation for Objective Structured Clinical Examinations (OSCEs) by testing clinical reasoning skills. Each video presents a clinical encounter and you are given the opportunity to develop an assessment, or differential diagnosis, and provide an appropriate diagnostic workup.

Featured New Books

This month a focus on two new books in the TUC Library:

[*Cancer Chronicles: Unlocking Medicine's Deepest Mystery*](#) by science writer George Johnson was selected as one of the New York Times' notable books of 2013. The book has been compared to other recent books about cancer including *The Emperor of All Maladies* by Siddhartha Mukherjee. The writing of *Cancer Chronicles* was triggered by uterine cancer that struck Johnson's wife. The book is both a personal story and the outcome of the lengthy fact finding about cancer and cancer research he undertook after his wife was diagnosed with cancer. He has been praised for "producing such a forthright and human" and readable work on a disease that impacts so many lives.

Most of us know Jane Goodall as the world renowned anthropologist and primatologist. Probably most persons do not know she also wrote a children's book with the title [*Dr. White*](#). Dr. Goodall notes that this book is based on a true story of a small white dog adopted by a London children's hospital and whose love and affection for the young patients helped in their recoveries. This story took place many years ago and is an example of early pet-assisted therapy before its benefits became widely recognized. Dr. Goodall writes in her author's note to the book: "When I learned about Dr. White and the comfort he gave to countless suffering children, I thought this story would be wonderful one to share. I hope children will share it with their parents." It seemed fitting that the TUC Library have this book in its Juvenile Collection. It is on order and if you would like to be notified when this book is available for check-out, let us know.
