News about Library Resources

New Journals

BMJ Case Reports coming to the Library early September offers a high volume of cases in all disciplines so that healthcare professionals, researchers and others can easily find clinically important information on common and rare conditions. All articles are peer reviewed BMJ contains the largest single collection of case reports online with more than 11,000 articles from over 70 countries. We will announce in the Library Website News column when this is available.

Added to the A-Z Journals listing on the TUC Library website is *The Journal of Research in Interprofessional Practice and Education (JRIPE)*, an open access journal that “disseminates theoretical perspectives, methodologies, and evidence-based knowledge to inform interprofessional practice, education, and research to improve health care delivery, quality of care, and health status for individuals, families, and communities.”

New Database

The Gideon database will be available in September. It will contain up-to-date information on infectious diseases around the globe.

Use *GIDEON's* Infectious Disease section to diagnose, treat and track information on infectious diseases from around the globe.

- Generate a country-specific diagnosis based on symptoms, signs, and laboratory data.
- Display the epidemiological profile of a selected disease and generate a list of diseases that fit a given set of epidemiological parameters.
- Identify country specific pre-travel information for travelers and medical practitioners.
- Review the pharmacology and usage of anti-infective drugs.
- Review the pharmacology and usage of vaccines.

General Book(s) of Interest

The Library has a small Leisure Collection of books and DVDs to give an occasional break from studies. New to the collection this month is Harper Lee's newly published novel [*Go Set a Watchman*](#). The comments she received to *Go Set a Watchman* from her editor led her to set aside that book for 55 years and to start writing [*To Kill a Mockingbird*](#) that has become a classic in American literature. Both books feature the same main characters lawyer Atticus Finch and his daughter Scout (Jean Louise), but Atticus Finch in *Go Set a Watchman* is no longer the paragon of wisdom and courage he was in *To Kill a Mockingbird* but in this new novel is a white supremacist. There has been a tremendous amount of anticipation, press, debate and controversy about this "new" Harper Lee book and the new/different portrayal of Atticus Finch in *Go Set a Watchman*. The Library also has [To Kill a Mockingbird in book](#) and [audio book format](#) and the DVD of the new anniversary edition of the [1964 Academy Award winning movie To Kill a Mockingbird](#) with Gregory Peck.
