New Journal Subscription: *Journal of Interprofessional Care*

New to our A-Z Journal collection starting on January 1st is the electronic journal - *Journal of Interprofessional Care*, a subscription added in the TUC Library in support of our campus IPE Program. The editor-in-chief states the "*Journal of Interprofessional Care* promotes collaboration in education, practice and research in education, health, social care and related fields:

- Within and between professions
- Within and between organizations
- With service users, carers and communities

It treats research as both a collaborative field in its own right and as a means to evaluate interprofessional education and practice. Since its launch in 1992, the Journal has retained its focus on education, health and social care and encouraged contributions from other fields where closer collaboration is critical to improve the quality of life for individuals, families and communities, and to establish and sustain a healthier environment. They include housing, public health, law enforcement and the treatment of offenders. Contributors and readers include service users, students, teachers, trainers, practitioners, managers, policy makers and researchers. "

Resource Spotlight: Sage Research Methods (SRM) & Sage Research Methods: Cases

Each month we highlight one of our TUC databases or other e-resources. This month's resource spotlight is on [Sage Research Methods](#) (SRM) & Sage Research Methods: Cases, research method tools that integrate SAGE's book, journal, and reference content with videos and advanced search and discovery tools. Researchers can "explore methods concepts to help them design research projects, understand particular methods or identify a new method, conduct their research, and write up their findings." SRM can be used for the social sciences and the health sciences. SRM Cases is a collection of case studies designed to help put abstract methodological concepts in context via practical examples. Digital Commons coming later this Spring

The Touro libraries very recently acquired a group license to Digital Commons, from Bepress, a hosted institutional repository software widely used in universities, colleges and other academic institutions for faculty, student, and staff writing including theses, poster session materials, etc. Touro procedures, policies, templates to guide use of this software are still in the process of being formulated. McClinnis. This unique book presents the treatment "roadmap" implemented by the University of Michigan Comprehensive Depression Center's Treatment Resistant Depression Program.

General DVDs of Interest

This is the season for movies. December typically has many new movie releases, and it is also a good time to see a film one has missed in the past. The TUC Library maintains a small, select collection of movies in DVD format for leisure viewing and check-out. The newest additions including films on order are listed below. [*Woman in Gold*](#) – An elderly Jewish woman (Helen Mirren) fights in court to regain family possessions seized by the Nazis including a famous Klimt painting of her aunt

[*Balto*](#) – An animation film about a sled dog that comes to the rescue of a small town during a diphtheria epidemic.

Trumbo – The story of American screenwriter James Dalton Trumbo who refused to testify before the U.S. House Un-American Activities Committee and is subsequently blacklisted. This is based on the true story of the Committee’s investigation of the Communist influence and Communist members in the film industry in Hollywood. (*On order*).

The Stanford Prison Experiment – This film is based on the actual experiment Stanford University Psychology Professor Philip Zimbardo conducted with some of his students in which some students took on the role of a prisoner and some of prison guards. The students who are guards became abusive and Zimbardo had to stop his experiment after only six days. (*On order*).

Me and Earl and the Dying Girl – A movie about high school loner, Greg Gaines, who is encouraged by his mother to re-establish his friendship with a childhood friend who has been diagnosed with acute myelogenous leukemia. His mother prods him to do this in order to help her, but she is the one in the end who helps him to find future direction in his life and studies. (*On order*).
