EMBASE!

The TUC Library now has access to Embase, one of the most comprehensive biomedical databases in the world with extensive coverage of international journals and conferences. With powerful search capabilities, including a wide-range of filters, limiters, and detailed term maps (called an Emtree) users can tailor their searches for the exact needs. While this resource is highly recommended for COP, COM, PA, and nursing students for their biomedical and clinical research needs, and is an essential tool for systematic reviews, anyone seeking information about health and medical topics will find this database extremely useful and full of information. The Library will offer classes on Embase use next month.
